► MESSAGE FROM THE AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION



The past year has seen considerable success and progress for Australian sport on the world stage, for the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) and our elite sport partners and athletes.

The Government's 2014–15 investment of nearly \$120 million continues to be refined to ensure funding is aligned to sports with the greatest potential to contribute to Australia's *Winning Edge 2012–2022* targets and maximise our chances at success.

Since *Winning Edge* was launched, the AIS re-allocated \$20 million of high performance funding among sports and boosted direct athlete funding (dAIS) by \$3.6 million or 40 per cent.

The Sports Tally 2015 — the annual report card for Australian sports — revealed promising signs as we gear up for the Rio 2016 Olympic and Paralympic Games, while highlighting some of the challenges presented by our performance at the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games.

In March the Commission launched *Play.Sport. Australia.* — our plan to help National Sporting Organisations build participation in sport and make sure all Australians enjoy its benefits. Sports have the opportunity to attract more than 4.5 million Australians into their communities. It's important that we work together to ensure that more Australians,

particularly young Australians, participate in sport more often and that we have strong organisations that deliver the products and opportunities Australians want.

Some highlights in 2014-15 included:

- **Personal excellence** — The most significant athlete wellbeing program in AIS history, incorporating myAISPlaybook — a new high performance athlete learning and development platform.
- **AIS Sports Draft** — Athletes selected in this fast-tracked development came together at the AIS to share their journeys as they transition to Olympic or Commonwealth Games sports.
- **AIS Centre for Performance Coaching and Leadership** — More than 45 coaches graduated from the centre, providing development and mentoring for our brightest coaches and administrators.

As our attention starts to focus on Rio and the major events leading up to the Games, I look forward to the ASC teaming up with your organisation to help put our athletes in the best possible position and enhance our chances of success.

► WE ARE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER

There were a number of great achievements attained in university sport in 2015. Our Unirooms brought home best ever results from the World Summer Universiade (Gwangju, Korea); the Australian Unigames (Gold Coast) was our largest ever in terms of participation; we did well financially and hit our sponsorship targets. Sport participation rates grew sector wide, while many new sporting facilities were built on campuses across the country. And yes, Sydney University Sport and Fitness continued on its merry winning ways! However, it is some of the less visible progress - what I call "future building steps" - made in 2015 that excites me most that I will discuss herewith.

Member engagement

Australian University Sport (AUS) and members met in regional forums more in 2015 than ever before to engage in discussion of key issues such as priority messaging, strategic planning and sport strategy, and engaging in dialogue about how we can best advocate about the value of sport in the student experience. I like to think we are building an ever strengthening appreciation that the business of developing a strong and well regarded sport industry, integral to a well rounded higher education, is a collective activity and we are all in it together. We will be aiming to further ramp up our levels of member engagement and servicing moving forward.

The positive impact of sport participation on student experience

It was Dr Tim Smith of RMIT University who declared at a regional forum (succinctly) that, in his opinion, the case for sport can best be made if participation can be shown to enhance the core business of universities: retention, completion and graduate employability. The converted believe that sport participation impacts positively on student engagement and experience. We as a sector need to find ways to better measure this belief, and better communicate the story. This will be another key focus moving forward and this again is a communal challenge.

The assimilation of university sport into the AIS international pathway

The Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) has signalled an increasing appreciation of the current and potential contribution that the university sport sector can make to the international performance pathway. The AIS has demonstrated this appreciation through increased support for our Unirooms' international competition program, and by extending funding support for our Elite Student-Athlete Program through to 2018. We aim to work harder with members, National Sporting Organisations and the National Institutes Network to maximise this potential through an ongoing commitment to dual career education and by facilitating collaboration and partnerships between key stakeholders.

Changing role of AUS

We have thoroughly enjoyed gaining inputs from members into our next quadrennial strategic plan (2016 – 2020) through our series of regional forums in 2015. Although we remain a peak body and with that role aim to provide strong sector leadership, we are guided by member inputs and ideas as to how we remain relevant and valuable to members. It is clear that AUS needs to continue to evolve and embrace change moving forward in areas such as sector leadership, advocacy, research and sport program innovation.

Finally, thanks to all members and stakeholders for your support, and thanks for another solid performance from Don and his team at AUS along with the collegiality and hard work contributed by fellow Directors.

In respect to Clause 8 (8.1 and 8.2) a member must be:

- An Australian higher education institution which in the opinion of the Board meets criteria specified in the By-Laws for membership under this part of this Rule.

The member will be represented by the designated Delivery Agent for Sport within the member organisation. In this clause Delivery Agent for Sport means the entity of or within the university or higher education institution, recognised by the university or higher education institution as being chiefly responsible for the delivery of sport, regular physical activity and recreational services on campus. A member will notify AUS of its Delivery Agent for sport and its relevant contact details and persons.

► LOOKING BACK WITH AN EYE TO THE FUTURE

With the 2012 - 2016 quadrennial planning period coming to a close, it is useful to track key areas of progress, while planning for the future. The numbers tell an interesting story.

Participation on campus

Census data way back in 2007 (the first year of VSU) indicates that 113,000 students participated in campus sport and recreation activities sector wide. In 2011, total participation was 150,000; a testimony to the resilience of sport during the VSU era and total credit to the efforts of members. The 2014 / 15 USBA survey indicates that total campus participation has climbed to over 220,000 (up from 209,000 in 2013 / 14). These are very impressive numbers and a credit to the work of all concerned.

AUS event participation

In 2011, just over 13,000 student-athletes participated in AUS multisport and championship events. In 2015 nearly 18,000 student-athletes participated in AUS events - a growth rate of more than 40%. Most of this growth can be attributed to the addition of sport programs and events, as well as the growth in participation at the Australian Unigames in particular.

Cost of sport delivery

The cost of delivering the 2011 AUS sport program was \$1.5 million, while the cost of delivering the sport program in 2015 rose to \$2.2 million. This increase is due to several factors including: larger events with increased participation are more costly to stage; opening ceremony costs have increased; and the Unirooms international program has grown significantly.

AIS Winning Edge and the Unirooms program

In 2007, the Unirooms World Summer Universiade (WUSG) program was 80% user pays for student-athletes. In 2011, with increased funding from the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS), the WUSG program was 50% subsidised by student-athletes, most of whom were also helped out by their respective university and national sporting organisations (NSOs).

In 2015, the average WUSG subsidy for student-athletes was 80% of the total program cost, due in large part to increased AIS funding from the Australia's Winning Edge program. It is also the case that AUS, universities and NSOs have increased levels of support for the Unirooms program and due to this assistance many student-athletes were in fact fully subsidised for international university sport competition in 2015. Not surprisingly, with increased levels of funding for the WUSG program, Unirooms results have improved with each successive Universiade in 2011, 2013 and peaking in 2015 with a best ever result in Gwangju, Korea.

Members' services

From 2007 through 2010 during the period of the Regional University Sport Funding Program (RUSFP) AUS was able to increase members' services investment from \$200,000 in 2007 to just over \$400,000 in 2010. It is noteworthy that all of this investment was government funded and sourced from the RUSFP from 2007 through 2010. The RUSFP terminated at the end of 2010 and in a difficult transition, AUS has maintained members' service funding into 2011, independent of government funding. In 2015 AUS invested over \$500,000 into members' services, and with the help of a membership fee increase, in 2016 AUS will spend approximately \$650,000 in this vital area.

Growth of AUS Reserves

In 2007 AUS was sailing pretty close to the breeze financially. It was in 2006 that AUS made its first longer term commitment to putting reserves away for a rainy day by placing \$200,000 into a Future Programs Maintenance Reserves fund (FPMR). The catalyst for this move was the advent of Voluntary Student Union legislation (VSU). AUS total assets at the end of 2015 are approximately \$2 million, and although 2016 will be a tight year financially for AUS, longer term asset and reserve growth is a solid achievement for AUS and members.

Governance and leadership

AUS and members have made big strides in respect to governance over the last four years in particular. The AUS Board now includes six elected Directors, two independent Directors appointed by the Board, and one Universities Australia Director appointed by Universities Australia every two years. The AUS Board is now underpinned by three very active sub-committees including the Finance and Risk Management Committee, the Sport Strategy Committee and the Nominations Committee. With the exception of the Nominations Committee, each of these Committees includes significant member representation.

Sport Delivery Agents (SDAs) on member campuses have also undergone significant restructuring over the past four years. Almost all SDAs are now university departments, controlled entities of the university, or Companies Limited by Guarantee. These structures enable sport on campus to be included and better aligned with the institution's strategic direction, while most SDAs are now reporting higher up the executive tree at their university.

2015 and beyond

2015 has been a solid year for AUS. The Australian Unigames held on the Gold Coast was our biggest ever with over 8,200 student-athletes participating and every AUS member was represented at the Games; the Unirooms performance was our best ever at a World Summer Universiade bringing home 19 medals; we hit sponsorship targets and had a positive financial result for the year. It is most satisfying that staff continue to meet key performance objectives set by the Board each year. The solid strategic alignment between the Board and staff is a fundamental driver of AUS success.

2016 - 2020

It could well be that university sport in Australia is better placed than ever before to grow and develop its aims and objectives. There is growing recognition throughout the sector that participation in sport is

a great way to enhance student experience, with emerging evidence that students who participate in sport are better retained and have higher graduation rates and employability prospects. AUS and members can and must better tell this story through a credible evidence base moving forward.

Finally, it will be the strength of collaboration and partnerships between AUS, its members and key stakeholders that will drive university sport to further success in the future. The challenges will be many, but collectively we are in good shape to tackle these challenges head on.

► NORTH

Outside of AUS events, the North region has seen significant developments in facilities, programs and stakeholder partnerships that have contributed significantly to sports growth.

- The AUS Be The Influence program was well attended by North member universities with more than 40 students attending the two workshops in Brisbane.
- Griffith University was announced as the official University Partner of the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games. Being the University Partner means local students will get to be closely involved in the build up and staging of the biggest sporting event in Australia this decade, including the provision of 250 internships with the Games organisers.
- Further congratulations to Griffith University for the best ever result by a Queensland university in the Australian University Games. On the back of seven pennants, two silvers and one bronze placing, Griffith University finished second overall.
- Bond University unveiled 'The Bullshark Cage' - its new High Performance Training Centre at the Bond Institute of Health and Sport. The new elite sporting facility encompasses a gym, recovery area, rehabilitation pools and altitude room.
- After a hiatus from attendance at Australian University Sport events, Central Queensland University (CQU) entered 30 participants across four teams and several individual disciplines in the Australian University Games on the Gold Coast. It marks the first steps for an all encompassing sports development strategy adopted by CQU.

- QUT Sport has collaborated with Facilities Management and the Faculty of Exercise and Nutrition Science on a new sporting facility design and project that will be completed in early 2017. This new facility features synthetic fields for two prominent Queensland University of Technology sports programs, teaching and learning facilities, as well as stadium seating and storage.
- James Cook University (Townsville) conducted major lighting upgrades to their main field which will allow for expansion of its social sport program and external stakeholder use. The \$500,000 project was officially unveiled in March 2016 in partnership with the university student association and the State Government.
- The University of Queensland is set to launch two state of the art pitches in the middle of 2016, capable of hosting a range of sports including hockey, soccer and touch football. Field 4 will boast International Hockey Federation (FIH) approved turf, while Field 5's surface is FIH and FIFA 1 star certified. The facility will also feature scoreboards, six changing rooms, a first aid office, an upstairs social viewing area and sprint and testing lanes.

► EAST

It was an action packed year for East members in 2015 with many achievements including new programs, clubs, intercollegiate competitions and impressive sporting performances at AUS events and within the international and domestic sporting arena.

The East welcomed the International College of Management, Sydney as a new member in 2015. They made their presence known by involving over 70 athletes at the Eastern Unigames and Australian Unigames. The Australian Defence Force Academy returned after a couple of years away from the membership.

Some highlights for members in 2015 include:

- The University of Wollongong and Western Sydney University launched the inaugural "Clash of Sports" event. The event had over 200 students participate in 10 teams and seven sports across two days.
- Over 200 students were involved with the University of Canberra and The Australian National University annual Intersport Day, igniting their intense rivalry across 12 sports.
- Two Be The Influence (BTI) program regional workshops were held in Canberra and Sydney and were attended by University Team Managers, captains and team managers from 14 universities and colleges. The Australian College of Physical Education also held its own BTI leadership training session for student leaders, involving key staff from the Greater Western Sydney Giants AFL Club.
- The University of Sydney claimed back to back Australian Unigames Overall Champion titles by securing 15 of the 64 pennants on offer. Adding to their trophy cabinet, they also took home the Snow Unigames title and AUS Overall Champion in 2015.
- The University of Newcastle celebrated their 50th year with their Sports Awards paying tribute to the rich history of sporting achievements amassed over that time.
- Student-athletes from the University of Technology Sydney represented Australia at the Red Bull Campus Cricket World Finals in India in October, placing fifth overall.

- Australian Catholic University had strong club growth with a Sydney futsal club founded and successful in taking out their first competition, and a Sydney rugby league club established and participating in the New South Wales Tertiary Rugby League Competition.
- Macquarie University claimed the Spirit of the Games trophy at the Snow Unigames. They also placed second for sport services and facilities in the annual International Student Barometer survey across Australian universities.
- Avondale College had four of their students awarded green and gold medals at the Australian Unigames across women's touch and basketball, and in men's touch and rugby 7's, a wonderful example of the talent within their very small team.
- Along with hosting the Eastern Unigames in Wagga Wagga, Charles Sturt University saw significant growth in their elite athlete program which now includes 52 students, including David Pocock and Rob Horne from the Wallabies Rugby World Cup team.
- University of Notre Dame Australia (UNDA) had two students from their men's Australian Unigames touch team represent Australia and Ireland in the Touch World Cup. 2015 also saw UNDA's continued support as an education partner of the Sydney Sixers in the National Twenty20 competition.
- The University of New South Wales men's snow team had a dominant performance at Snow Unigames receiving four gold, multiple silver and a bronze to hand them the Uebergang Cup and the men's pennant.

REGIONAL REPORTS

► SOUTH

In 2015 South members continued to provide a wealth of opportunities for students to participate in sport, from community events to social sport, intervarsity competition and international competition. All members continued to excel in their commitment to work together to ensure students use sport as a vehicle to enhance student experience.

Eight Victorian members collaborated to increase participation in UniHub, an initiative that provides opportunities for students to participate in community events. Over 1,200 students were given access to UniHub services over four events. UniHub participants contributed to the \$5.8 million that was raised for charities during these events.

In 2015 the second Victorian Intersvarsity Rugby competition was held with The University of Melbourne crowned champions. The University Lacrosse Championship had an increased level of participation from members across South Australia and Victoria and the inaugural University Squash Cup was held as a sanctioned AUS event for the first time. The annual Varsity Challenge between The University of Melbourne and Monash University was held in March with Monash University retaining the title. The SA Challenge was won by The University of Adelaide after they dominated the Summer and Winter Challenge.

International success was achieved through Monash University's women's 3x3 basketball team, crowned FISU World University League Champions in Xiamen, China. The University of Melbourne student-athlete, Dylan Alcott, won 12 titles in wheelchair tennis, the highlight of which was the US Open Wheelchair Singles title.

Success for the South at the Australian Unigames was led by Monash University who achieved a top three result in the overall rankings being joined by RMIT University (sixth), The University of Melbourne (seventh) and Flinders University (tenth) as the highest ranked South members. University of South Australia and Swinburne University of Technology both had top 20 results.

The University of Melbourne was the inaugural winner of the AUS Community Leadership award for their

partnership with Athletics Australia in the development of the Raise the Bar Academy. The program was created to provide opportunities for Indigenous high school students to experience the opportunities available to student-athletes while pursuing a tertiary education.

Other highlights for the year included:

- Deakin University announced a facility upgrade to their Elite Sports Precinct at the Waurin Ponds campus providing increased space for sport to be conducted in regional Victoria.
- The AUS South office moved from Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre to Deakin University, Burwood campus in October.
- The University of Melbourne rowing team was crowned champions of the Australian University Rowing Championship. The women won their fifth consecutive Bella Guerin Trophy at the Australian Boat Race against The University of Sydney.
- The University of Melbourne was crowned the 2015 AFL Intersvarsity champions. They defeated The Australian National University in a pilot tournament that aims to assist with establishing a national varsity AFL competition.
- Full compliance with the University Sport Business Analysis, with all South members submitting returns this year.
- Be The Influence participation was excellent across the region with two workshops being held in Melbourne and Adelaide and many members conducting their own programs on campus.
- RMIT University and The University of Melbourne soccer clubs implemented the "Fair Go Sport" initiative through the Victorian Human Rights Commission to create safe and inclusive environments in their clubs to tackle homophobic harassment, discrimination and exclusion in sport.

► TERTIARY SPORTS WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The Tertiary Sports Western Australia (TSWA) program attracted over 1,500 competitors, officials, staff and volunteers from five universities and seven campuses across the Perth metropolitan area and regional Western Australia. Held from March to August, the TSWA program provided West Australian students and teams with opportunities to participate in state championships, qualifiers for the Australian Unigames and feature events.

A total of 11 multisport events featuring 22 sports and 40 competitions were held across 21 venues attracting

165 teams. The program achieved a gender ratio of 56% males and 44% females and team occupancy of 77%. A total of 39 student competitors (20 men, 19 women) were selected as 'Alcohol. Think Again.' Best & Fairest players throughout the TSWA program in 2015 and university team representation in four targeted community events and university selection trials generated further participation of 2,121.

► MARKETING

AUS again developed and distributed a complete suite of printed and electronic marketing collateral to members to assist them to promote and market the full calendar of AUS events. For the fourth year in a row, members were provided with design files to allow them to personalise the collateral to their specific university messages.

A primary focus for AUS marketing activities in 2015 was to increase the level of engagement between AUS and its fans, particularly via social media channels. The introduction of Facebook event pages specific to each event provided a central hub for student-athletes to access event specific content relevant to them. These pages were instrumental in driving total Facebook reach to 1.3 million people and generating 37,907 unique visitors.

Live streaming on the UnigamesTV YouTube channel, www.youtube.com/playunigames, generated significant content and traffic across Unibattle, the Regional Unigames and the Australian Unigames. An increase in live streaming capacity saw compound growth in simultaneously broadcasting all three Regional Unigames, in addition to Unibattle and the Australian Unigames. The number of minutes watched across all event videos increased by 113% to 195,000 minutes, while viewership increased by 40% to 51,194 views. Following the success of the broadcasts from the Regional Unigames, AUS further increased broadcast engagement and commercial opportunities by structuring the Australian Unigames finals to maximise live streaming coverage across multiple sports, garnering more than 51,000 minutes watched and 7,600 views.

► MEDIA

A number of major announcements were made by AUS as well as acknowledgements of achievements by AUS members throughout 2015 that were distributed to media outlets and the broader Australian sport sector. These included:

- AUS Awards – recognition for outstanding sporting achievements in 2015 and announcement of additional categories.
- The Australian Universities rugby team participating in the National Sevens Championship.
- Cheer taking the national stage at the Australian Unigames.
- The newest AUS event, Unibattle.
- The Red Bull Campus Cricket National and World Finals.

AUS engaged Jump Media to support the AUS High Performance team in identifying and leveraging media stories about elite student-athletes competing at the World Summer Universiade in Gwangju, Korea. Notable outcomes included:

- Sunday Telegraph story on Michelle Jenneke's life as a student-athlete.
- Weekend Australian magazine picture on Lauren Mitchell talking of her combined student-athlete life.
- Alan Jones 2GB interview with Nick Hough and his release of a student app.
- Widespread national media coverage of daily reports via AAP.
- Strong local media coverage via media releases to local and regional media outlets.
- Engagement of universities, institutes and National Sporting Organisations with strong distribution via digital / social channels.
- Cross promotion with Eurosport of World Summer Universiade coverage.
- Daily inclusion of World Summer Universiade news via the ASC Clearinghouse for Sport news digest.

SPECIAL EVENTS

► GAMES LAUNCHES

Continuing the same strategy employed in 2014, AUS staged three event launches in the first half of 2014 on host Regional Unigames campuses in Toowoomba, Wagga Wagga and Adelaide. These launches were designed to raise awareness of sporting opportunities locally on these campuses and to raise the profile of the Games to generate registrations and interest. Elite sporting talent from host universities and VIP stakeholder representatives were leveraged in the media to profile the launches.

The fourth launch of the year was held for the Australian Unigames at partner university Bond University, featuring a duel in the pool competition that provided guests with a taste of the Games' competitive atmosphere. Olympian, world record holder and student-athlete Melanie Wright (née Schlanger) raced against her husband and other elite student-athlete swimmers representing universities from southeast Queensland in a tight race against the clock.

► CEREMONIES

AUS held Opening Ceremonies at the Eastern and Australian Unigames, and Closing Ceremonies at the Northern and Southern Unigames. The official formalities and opening of the Games were held at an invitation only VIP function for event stakeholders, university team managers and team captains.

The JanSport Australian Unigames Opening Ceremony was held at the iconic Surfers Paradise beach on Queensland's Gold Coast. The music festival style event featured a slew of DJ acts, activity zones with an inflatable obstacle course, photo booths, food trucks and sponsor activations. The VIP function held nearby was hosted by the Bond University team captains and included the team captain photo – building on a new tradition started in 2014.

► CLOSING PRESENTATIONS

Closing presentations were held at the conclusion of all events, acknowledging overall university winners, per capita winners, Spirit of the Games awardees and trophy and pennant winners for each sport. VIP stakeholders, university team managers and team captains were invited to represent their universities at these functions.

► SOCIAL PROGRAM

AUS engaged night club venues in each host city location as a risk management strategy to provide exclusive and safe venues for students to socialise each night of the Games.

Red Frogs Australia were on hand at all events to provide participants with hydration stations and general on ground peer support.

► 2015 WINTER UNIVERSIADE

The 2015 Winter Universiade was conducted as two separate events across two countries. Nordic skiing and biathlon were held in Strbske Pleso, Slovakia from 24 January to 1 February with the remainder of sports held in Granada, Spain from 3 to 14 February.

Given the separate locations and break down of sports, AUS did not include any administration officials with the team. The Australian team included 13 athletes in four sports and was supported by a coach / manager in each discipline as well as one physiotherapist.

The Winter Universiade was again identified as an important development opportunity for the Australian

cross country skiing squad. The results achieved by the snowboard team were also an improvement on previous years.

Result highlights include the following top 10 results:

- Michaela Davis-Meehan, fourth in snowboard ladies slopestyle.
- Amber Arazny, eighth in snowboard ladies slopestyle.
- Phillip Bellingham, eighth in men's cross country sprint free.

HIGH PERFORMANCE

► WORLD SUMMER UNIVERSIADE

Held in Gwangju, Korea the World Summer Universiade was the largest ever in terms of total participation as well as the number of sports and events on offer.

Australia's participation in 15 of the 21 sports on offer contributed to this country's largest ever international university team being assembled to compete in a FISU sanctioned event. The Australian delegation of 181 athletes and 85 officials included a total of 15 Olympians and 23 Commonwealth Games athletes and returned home having won 19 medals – the country's largest ever medal haul from a Universiade event. Our medal tally placed Australia 15th overall.

Other Australian achievements of note at the World Summer Universiade included:

- Women's artistic gymnastics team included for the first time since 1997.
- First Australian team for pistol shooting.
- First Australian women's water polo medal.
- The appointment of key National Sporting Organisation staff or experienced team managers was a key improvement including a swimming high performance manager, basketball senior men's and women's team staff and appointment of nine targeted and experienced high performance athletics coaches.
- The level of medical support was also a positive improvement. All key sports with the exception of volleyball brought at least one physio, while athletics brought two and women's basketball brought a soft tissue therapist.

► OTHER RESULTS TO NOTE:

- Athletics: 19 x top eight performances (team of 34 athletes).
- Shooting: four x top eight (team of eight athletes).
- Swimming: 23 x top eight (team of 19 athletes).
- Men's water polo finished seventh however beat or tied with the gold and silver medallists.
- Basketball women – lost one match in quarter finals and this loss can be attributed to losing only one quarter of the match.

The World Summer Universiade should be viewed as another successful cycle in the history of university sport in Australia. With continued competitive success combined with acknowledgment in the wider Australian sporting community, the future continues to look bright for the program. The 2017 Summer Universiade in Taipei will provide opportunity for university sport to further improve connectivity with National Sporting Organisations in support of Australia's elite student-athletes.

► ELITE STUDENT-ATHLETE PATHWAY PROGRAM

The Elite Student-Athlete Pathway (ESAP) program is a joint partnership between the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) and AUS. In 2015 AUS continued to develop the ESAP program working closely with AUS member universities, national sporting organisations (NSOs), the national institute network (NIN), elite student-athletes and other stakeholders in support of Australia's Winning Edge 2012-2022 strategy.

Key outcomes for 2015 include:

AIS talent pool expansion

- AIS Sports Draft received fantastic support from several universities to assist in the delivery of the 2015 Sports Draft state based testing sessions.
- AIS Sports Draft received strong student-athlete participation at this year's Australian Unigames.
- Five regional universities expressed their interest in becoming Talent Assessment Centres.

University Elite Athlete Support

- Elite athlete workshops were held in Brisbane and Sydney for university, NSO and NIN support staff.
- AUS sourced speakers and attended the Elite Athlete Friendly University biannual conference.
- AUS representative served as a panellist on the Queensland University of Technology 2016 Elite Athlete scholarship panel.
- AUS provided advice in The University of Queensland 2016 elite athlete scholarship review.

University, NSO and NIN connectivity

- AIS Pathways Connect e-platform provided a direct link to share university information with NSOs.
- Assisted in connecting universities with high performance sport programs i.e. University of the Sunshine Coast / NRL Melbourne Storm, Australian Catholic University / Netball Queensland.
- AUS is working with Volleyball Australia, Table Tennis Australia, Badminton Australia, Diving Australia and the Australian Weightlifting Federation to assist in identifying and establishing potential areas of collaboration.
- Presentation at QAS Water Polo Induction by an AUS representative.

AUS Awards

- New award categories and online nomination processes were implemented.

2015 AUSTRALIAN UNIGAMES

Gold Coast QLD 27 Sep - 3 Oct

The 2015 Australian Unigames attracted 8,277 student-athletes and 721 non playing officials. With an additional large number of staff, volunteers, officials and suppliers, there were over 9,600 people involved in the event, the highest total in the event's history.

The Games returned to the Gold Coast as part of the two year cycle, which is made possible by the strong support provided by Tourism and Events Queensland, the City of Gold Coast and partner university Bond University. The Gold Coast always proves to be an attractive location for students, with a dynamic range of accommodation options, high quality sporting venues and non sporting attractions of the city. The Australian Unigames participants almost take over the Gold Coast during the event, being highly visible in their team uniforms.

Experiences within the Games is now turning the event into a sporting festival – an opportunity not to be missed in the student community. Many students return to compete in the Games numerous times throughout their student life, adding to the competitiveness on the field as they strive to improve their and their team's performance. The Games also instil a sense of pride as students compete for their university and make friends for life. Feedback from participants repeatedly shows that students consider the Unigames experience a highlight of their student life.

East members enjoyed a return to Wagga Wagga for the 2015 Eastern Unigames after a 17 year hiatus from the traditional sporting town with the support of event partners Charles Sturt University, Wagga Wagga City Council and Destination NSW. The event attracted over 3,000 competitors, officials, staff and volunteers from 16 universities and colleges. Competitors travelled from across New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory, with 16 sports contested across the week of the Games.

AUSTRALIAN UNIVERSITY CHAMPIONSHIPS

► DISTANCE RUNNING

In the third year of the expanded format, the Championships further developed to include the Chevron City to Surf Perth alongside the four major running events: the Gold Coast Airport Marathon, Real Insurance Sydney Harbour 10km, Blackmore's Sydney Harbour Running Festival and the Medibank Melbourne Marathon. This year's event series had a significant change to the scoring to allow for a greater level of competition across participation at all five events. The overall championship was won by The University of Sydney who also won the men's pennant whilst Griffith University won the women's pennant.

► ORIENTEERING

Hosted in conjunction with the Australian Orienteering Championship in Bri Glen, South Australia, a total of 11 male and 10 female students competed from seven universities. Due to the low number of participants pennants were not awarded for this Championship in 2015.

► ROWING

The 2015 Rowing Championships was held in Adelaide and hosted by Rowing South Australia. The perfect conditions provided excellent racing for over 230 student-athletes in the regatta of which a large contingent were from the local universities: University of South Australia and The University of Adelaide. The University of Sydney retained the overall championship and the men's pennant, whilst The University of Melbourne won the women's pennant.

► SURFING

In 2015, the Surfing Championships were held in July, immediately following the Regional Unigames. The event attracted strong participation from more than 10 universities with 80 board riders taking to the beaches of Port Macquarie, New South Wales. This year's event attracted several ASP world tour riders which showcased the strong surfing community represented within the university sector. The 2015 overall championship was retained by Southern Cross University who also won the men's pennant on the back of World Surf League rider Mitchell James. Monash University attended with a team of more than 20 student-athletes and with eight female surfers, won the women's pennant.

► SNOW UNIGAMES

This year's Snow Unigames saw a record number of participants attend the event at Thredbo, New South Wales. Over 430 participants tamed the mountain conditions across the disciplines of snowboard, ski and cross country. This year's Snow Unigames introduced a scoring system aligned with what currently is in practice across our other AUS events with a medal tally used. Under this system it allowed for the smaller universities to be more competitive. This year's overall champion was awarded to The University of Sydney who also secured the women's pennant whilst The University of New South Wales led by Olympian Scott Kneller won the men's pennant. The highly prized Spirit of the Mountain was awarded to Macquarie University who brought their largest team in the event's history. Strong results from the University of Technology Sydney and the University of New England also saw one of the closest Championship finishes in the event's history.

► TRIATHLON

In the third year of the expanded event series the rules were reassessed to provide an opportunity for more universities to qualify with the inclusion of a sprint category as well as lower requirements on number of participants. Under the revised format the University of Technology Sydney reclaimed the title of overall champion as well as winning both the men's and women's pennant. This year's event series included legs in the Australian Capital Territory, South Australia, Queensland, Victoria and New South Wales.

► TWENTY20™ CRICKET

In 2015, Red Bull Australia partnered with AUS to deliver the Red Bull Campus Cricket Australian Qualifiers held as part of the Australian Unigames. The five day tournament offered university cricket players a chance to battle it out to earn bragging rights and a spot in the Red Bull Campus Cricket World Final in Sri Lanka in October 2016. The University of Sydney fought hard in the final to come back against 2014 winners, University of New South Wales, to snatch victory and secure their ticket to the world stage. Red Bull will continue their support of this competition as the naming rights partner in 2016 and providing appropriate venues can be sourced within future host cities, these championships will remain within the multisport format of the Australian Unigames in future.

► UNIBATTLE

After significant research into trends in Australian sport and through consultation with AUS members, a new event was designed to take into consideration sports that are developing in the recreational space of university campuses. The inaugural Unibattle event attracted 220 student-athletes from 11 universities, who competed in the sports of 3x3 Basketball, Dodgeball, Floorball, Quidditch and Softball Social 7s. Whilst participation numbers were lower than expected, the feedback on the event from participants will see the sport line up grow in 2016 to include beach sports and other hybrid versions of traditional sports.

There is no overall champion awarded at the Unibattle event however the following universities were successful in winning their competitions. All competitions (excluding 3x3 Basketball offer a mixed or open competition)

The 3x3 basketball champions were awarded an invitation to attend the FISU 3x3 World League event held in China in October 2015. Southern Cross University were selected for the men's competition at this event and whilst the team did not medal, they were highly competitive against the other international teams. The women's team that attended this event was from Monash University and they won bronze.

► FISU OCEANIA

Once again, AUS has taken a proactive and supportive role in the development of FISU Oceania often using its scale to coordinate and assist other member countries to access FISU events and to grow and develop university sport in their countries. Members of FISU Oceania are American Samoa, Australia, Cook Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Fiji, Guam, New Caledonia, New Zealand, Northern Mariana Islands, Papua New Guinea and Samoa.



► GOVERNANCE

Since 2011 AUS has offered a bureau service to FISU Oceania for all its administrative and financial activities. With AUS Board member Martin Doulton as the President and the FISU Oceania representative member on the FISU Executive Committee and the FISU Oceania Finance Management Committee under the guidance of its Chair Don Knapp, together with the support of AUS Finance and Administration Manager Glenys Woolcock and secretarial support by Toni Lourens, FISU Oceania administrative and finances continue to meet all FISU audit requirements.

► FISU OCEANIA AT THE 2015 SUMMER UNIVERSIADE

In 2015, 250 student-athletes from FISU Oceania competed at the Summer Universiade in Gwangju, South Korea. While the majority of these competitors represented Australia (181) and New Zealand (66), Northern Marianas Islands and the Federated States of Micronesia were also represented. In total, FISU Oceania won 24 medals with Australia taking home four gold, three silver and 12 bronze while New Zealand returned home with one gold, three silver and one bronze.

Unfortunately many of the FISU Oceania members had teams participating in the Pacific Games held in Papua New Guinea at the same time as the Summer Universiade and therefore reduced the number of teams / participants available for the Universiade in Gwangju.

► FISU OCEANIA AT THE 2015 WINTER UNIVERSIADE

Held from 24 January to 1 February 2015 at Strbske Pleso / Osrblie and from 4 to 14 February at Granada, FISU Oceania was represented by Australia (13) and New Zealand (1) in cross country skiing, snowboard, biathlon and figure skating.

► FISU OCEANIA AT THE 2015 FISU WUL 3X3 BASKETBALL

Held from 9-11 October, in Xiamen China, the 2015 FISU WUL 3x3 Basketball event attracted teams from all over the world with the Oceania Region being represented by Monash University (women) and Southern Cross University (men).

While the men's team finished a very respectable seventh position, the Monash University women's team were eventual bronze medal winners.

► FISU OCEANIA AT THE FISU GENERAL ASSEMBLY

FISU Oceania was represented by Australia, New Zealand and Northern Mariana Islands at the 34th FISU General Assembly held in Lausanne, Switzerland from 7-8 November.

For the first time, the General Assembly was held outside of a Summer Universiade and as a stand alone event. At the General Assembly a new FISU President and Executive Committee were appointed. The new FISU Executive for the 2015-2019 mandate period are:

► AUS AWARDS

Many outstanding performances and contributions have been recorded by student-athletes, coaches and universities participating in sport and leadership programs throughout the Australian university sporting community. AUS recognises these achievements and contributions under a national university sport award scheme called the 'Australian University Sport Awards'. There are seven awards in total, two of which are new in 2015. The AUS Awards fall into two categories – Dual Career Education Awards and University and Community Leadership. The two new awards are 'Most Outstanding Performance of the Year by an Athlete with a Disability' and secondly 'Community Leadership' award.

The **Dual Career Education Awards** recognise and reward outstanding athletic performances by student-athletes and their contributions to university sport. There are now four awards divided into two sub-categories:

- Recognition of athletic performances at a significant international sporting event by a student-athlete e.g. Olympic, Paralympic, World Championships.
- Most Outstanding Sporting Achievement of the Year;
- Most Outstanding Performance of the Year by an Athlete with a Disability.
- Recognition of athletic performances at an AUS endorsed event by a student-athlete e.g. World Summer or Winter Universiade, Australian Unigames, Snow Unigames and Australian University Championships.
- Male Athlete of the Year;
- Female Athlete of the Year.

The **University and Community Leadership Awards** recognise and reward athletic performances of a university team, the contributions of a coach and a university based program dedicated to building capacity to promote positive attitudes and behaviours. There are three awards:

- Team of the Year;
- Coach of the Year; and
- Community Leadership.
