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MESSAGE FROM THE AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION

It has been another significant year for the Australian Sports Commission and the sports network as we continue to work together to pursue victory on the world stage and inspire all Australians to experience the joy of sport.

Despite a challenging economic environment, in 2013 -14 the Australian Government invested almost \$120 million in our national sporting organisations. In high performance, Australia's Winning Edge continues to evolve as we target sports with potential to deliver international success and invest more in our most promising athletes.

Some highlights in 2013 -14 have included:

- Campaign Rio — a partnership between the AIS, Australian Olympic Committee and Australian Paralympic Committee to prepare athletes for the Rio Olympic Games.
- AIS Centre for Performance Coaching and Leadership — the Centre continues to develop Australia's coaches and high performance leaders, with a Podium Coach program launched.
- AIS Sports Draft — a fast-tracked development program for talented athletes who are interested in transferring to Olympic or Commonwealth Games sports.

Our work with sports to reform governance structures and develop their strategic and commercial capabilities also continues. The ASC is determined to create better businesses and we are leading the way with a lean and agile operating model, a new AIS brand, and continued focus on philanthropy through the Australian Sports Foundation.

Grassroots participation remains a key priority, with the Australian Government's announcement of the Sporting Schools program a significant endorsement of community sport. The \$100 million program will commence in 2015 — reaching more than 850,000 children — and will enable sports to boost their participation numbers.

Australian sport is on a transformative journey. Few periods have been filled with so much activity or so much promise, and I appreciate your hard work and support over the past year. By joining us on this journey you continue to prove your capacity to succeed in this ever-changing sporting landscape.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



This is the conclusion to my first term as AUS President and I would like to share a number of the year's highlights with you. I begin by acknowledging the enormous dedication and passion of our members in the pursuit of delivering quality university sport programs on campuses. The positive changes that we are seeing within the university sporting sector are a tribute to all members, as well as the AUS Board and staff. As your representative, AUS and the Board will continue to represent your interests and build strong relationships with key stakeholders to enhance the sustainability of university sport.

It is evident that AUS continues to grow and improve as an organisation and there has been considerable progress in 2014. Here are some of the highlights from my perspective.

1. Research Project

The project submission made to The National Office for Learning and Teaching spearheaded by lead Institutional Partner Bond University proposes further exploring the links between participation in sport and retention and graduate employability. If the submission is successful, and if the findings support the hypothesis, this project will enhance the positioning and status of AUS in the higher education landscape. It is significant that both the ASC and AOC have agreed to partner AUS in this project, and we thank both for their ongoing support.

2. Success of Student Athletes Overseas

Australia posted sixteen top eight performances at World University Championship events and came home with two medals, one silver in the match racing and one bronze in the rowing. Student athletes also dominated Australia's medal tally at the Glasgow Commonwealth Games.

3. International Relations

Through the AUS and British University and Colleges Sport (BUCS) partnership, we were pleased to host BUCS CEO Karen Rothery and Director Phil Attwell at our 2014 National Conference. Their respective presentations were well received. I had the pleasure of reciprocating and presenting at the BUCS Conference in Swansea in July. AUS also hosted a BUCS intern at the 2014 Australian University Games (AUG) in Sydney as a means of fostering even greater understanding at the operational event delivery level between the two organisations.

The AUS role with FISU Oceania reached new heights with AUS Director Martin Doulton elected as President in September. AUS will also be nominating Martin to the FISU Executive committee in 2015. AUS continues to play an influential support role in the Oceania region and CEO Don Knapp will continue in his role as Finance Director for OUSA (ex officio).

4. AUS Events

Along with the cultural mantra of striving for "the best outcomes for sport", 2014 events demonstrated continual improvement. It is however our university members that have the greatest influence on the standard and competitiveness of both regional and Australian University Games. The quality of sport improves annually at these events, and the new qualifications guidelines crafted by the Sport Strategy Committee this year will further improve competition standards in future.

Congratulations in particular to The University of Sydney who edged out the usual suspects The University of Melbourne (2nd) and Monash University (3rd) to win the 2014 Overall Champions Trophy, and to University of Canberra who took out the 2014 Overall Per capita Trophy. Thanks to all members and of course student participants for their support and enjoyment of AUS events.

4. Governance

I take this opportunity to thank members for their overwhelming support of the Constitutional amendments adopted at the AGM in May. These changes brought AUS in line with best practice governance standards espoused by the ASC. The process was seamless and I believe this evidences the solid working relationship that exists between AUS and members. We will continue to closely monitor AUS governance standards aiming to better serve members on an ongoing basis.

Finally, I would like to thank the AUS Board and subcommittees for their exceptional leadership and contributions throughout the year, while acknowledging the hard work of CEO Don Knapp and his staff in delivering another good year in 2014.

MEMBERSHIP CLASSES

The categories of membership of AUS, (collectively called "members") as outlined in the AUS constitution shall be:

- a) Members as described in rule 8, and
- b) Life members as described in rule 9 and
- c) any other category or categories of membership as determined by the Board.

In respect to Clause 8 (8.1 and 8.2) a member must be:

- 8.1 a) An Australian University; or
- b) An Australian higher education institution which in the opinion of the Board meets criteria specified in the By Laws for membership under this part of this Rule.
- 8.2 The member will be represented by the designated Delivery Agent for Sport within the member organisation. In this clause Delivery Agent for Sport means the entity of or within the University or higher education institution, recognised by the University or higher education institution as being chiefly responsible for the delivery of sport, regular physical activity and recreational services on campus. A member will notify AUS of its Delivery Agent for Sport and its relevant contact details and persons.

The company is incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 and is a company limited by guarantee. If the company is wound up, the constitution states that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$1.00 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the company. At 31 December 2014, the total amount that members of the company are liable to contribute if the company is wound up is \$40 (2013: \$40).

Each year the AUS Board and Management Team set specific annual performance targets and following a positive financial year in 2013, we were able to move ahead with an ambitious agenda for 2014. This report will focus specifically on progress made for key result areas during the calendar year.

1. University Sport Business Analysis Survey (USBA)

Thirty one out of 40 AUS members completed and returned USBA surveys in 2014. AUS in partnership with the Centre for Tourism and Leisure Management (CERM) issued results by way of a sector wide summary report, and individual member reports. The 3 main drivers of the USBA project included:

- to create an instrument that enhances sector wide business of sport literacy;
- to create an information set that can assist members' capability to more effectively lobby at campus level; and
- to create a body of information that enhances AUS's capability of lobbying for university sport nationally.

The USBA project is a key element in the growth and development of the university sport sector moving forward: underscored by the support of the Board for AUS to fully fund report subscriptions for members as part of our services platform.

2. Inclusive Participation in Sport

Through the newly developed AUS on-line registration system, participation numbers for each of the targeted demographic groups was measured and reported to the Board and ASC as per the latter's reporting requirements.

AUS was also invited to take an active role in assisting with the delivery of the National Indigenous Games.

Although it is acknowledged that for many members, it may be difficult to measure participation rates for these groups for campus based sport programs, AUS will be encouraging this practice in future.

3. Research Project - Retention and Graduate Employability

AUS has established a partnership with British University

and Colleges Sport (BUCS) and sharing knowledge was a key aspect of this partnership. In 2013 BUCS commissioned Sheffield Hallam Sport Industry Research group to explore the link between participation in sport and graduate employability. At the 2014 National Conference, BUCS CEO Karen Rothery presented the findings of the Sheffield Hallam research project. In summary, there was considerable evidence indicating that graduates who participate in sport throughout their higher education years are more employable than non-participants.

Following the BUCS lead, we have invested our efforts in developing an Australian based study that will explore the links between sport participation as an engagement activity that enhances retention and graduate employability. We also hope to extend this project to explore the links between sport participation while at university and ongoing alumni engagement.

AUS, in partnership with lead university Bond, have made a submission for a research grant to the National Office for Learning and Teaching (OLT). We anticipate an outcome to the proposal in June 2015. Other partners to the submission include MQU, QUT, University of Canberra, the AOC and the ASC. We believe this project and the findings could well provide a better positioning and enhance the value of sport throughout the higher education sector.

4. Organisation Infrastructure

2014 welcomed the introduction of the AUS on-line registration and accreditation system operated through the Fusesport platform. On-line registrations have certainly streamlined the accreditation process for AUS events as well as providing efficiencies in member workload and the registration process for participants - a win for all.

5. Sport Sector Leadership - Be the Influence (BTI)

AUS again invested significant resources to roll out 4 four BTI workshops regionally catering to over 250 student leaders in sport and UTM's. PricewaterhouseCoopers again supported the program as education and training partners. It is evident that the program is well supported by members, and most importantly, student participants. It is also pleasing to note that many members are

developing their own leadership programs, positioning sport and leadership together, thus enhancing the value of sport proposition on campus.

AUS also invested resources into further developing the BTI curriculum in partnership with Sports Medicine Australia. As demand grows for the BTI program, a challenge for AUS is to gear up to better meet demand: we would like to be in a position to deliver campus based programs, largely through our RDMs and we will be moving in this direction in 2015.

6. Alignment of University High Performance and the NIN

2014 saw AUS and the AIS enter into a new partnership that resulted in the creation and appointment of an Elite Student Athlete Pathway (ESAP) Manager. The major aims of the ESAP program include:

- to better connect university high performance programs with NIN and NSOs;
- to identify areas and services whereby universities could offer complementary support to NIN and NSOs;
- to identify gaps in the NIN program that universities could fill;
- to facilitate and encourage partnerships between NSOs and universities where mutually beneficial; and
- positioning university high performance programs as a value add proposition to the NIN and NSO networks.

The ESAP program has the potential to significantly elevate the utility and importance of university high performance programs within the national sporting landscape.

7. Continual Improvement of Sport Outcomes: 2014 AUG

Staging the 2014 AUG in Sydney was always going to be a challenge. We were pleased that the event was so successfully delivered with few hitches. Highlights of the AUG included:

- students competed in some of Australia's best sporting facilities with the use of Sydney Olympic Park and other Sydney 2000 Olympic facilities;
- The level of support provided by Destination NSW, UTS, MQU, UWS, UNSW and USYD ensuring the event was viable.

8. New Qualification Guidelines for AUGs

Early in 2014 AUS restructured and invited some new faces onto its Sport Strategy Committee under the Chair of Liz Brett. New qualification rules that reinforce the pathway between the Regional University Games and the AUG were developed. Through extensive consultation and robust debate a solution that appears to satisfy our very diverse membership has been achieved. We are confident the new formula will improve the quality of sport at our events.

9. Finance

The Finance and Risk Management Committee chaired by AUS Director Kim Guerin had an active year and continues to provide AUS with strong leadership and support. Areas of major focus in 2014 included financial reporting standards, a review of how we handle risk management, and overseeing a forensic financial audit examining the efficacy and accountability of AUS financial processes and procedures.

For 2014, it is pleasing to announce that we have again exceeded budget surplus forecasts by a considerable margin.

10. Acknowledgements

The Board and subcommittee structure of AUS has served the organisation well again in 2014. I believe we continue to improve the organisation and have made substantial progress in key result areas. I thank all Directors and subcommittee members for their generous commitment of time and expertise.

In respect to staff, 2014 has been another successful year and we have again demonstrated our collective ability to operationalise the strategic directions established by the Board. Thanks to all staff for another solid year.

Members of course make the organisation. Your ongoing support of the AUS strategic direction, events and activities is recognised and appreciated and of course vital to the sustainability of university sport. I note also the continued growth and development of campus based sport programs and facilities - a testament to your efforts.

It is however students, officials and volunteers that participate in and support our events and activities that make the greatest contribution to the success, or otherwise, of AUS. Thanks for your support in another great year of university sport.

NORTH

In conjunction with a successful Northern University Games, the following are a selected number of achievements by North members in 2014:

- Officially established as a department within the university, Queensland University of Technology unveiled a revamped program, including all new logos, full sports scholarships and their mascot, Tank the Tiger.
- Bond University introduced the Georgina Hope Rinehart Swimming Excellence Scholarship and announced its first two recipients. The full academic scholarships are available for a minimum of three years and also include a bursary for the holders.
- James Cook University completed irrigation installation on their iconic cricket field after securing \$100,000 in funding from the Queensland government. 2015 will see lights erected at the field, valued at more than \$200,000.
- Social sport at Griffith University saw a huge increase, total teams expanding from 194 to 278, with the opening of a new indoor futsal centre a big draw card.
- Along with being an NUG partner, the University of the Sunshine Coast also saw their social sport program double; futsal, football, basketball and volleyball seeing the biggest growth.

EAST

2014 for the East region saw significant growth for members with social sport, clubs and intercollegiate rivalries. The year also brought some stand out performances throughout AUS events and in the domestic and international sporting arena. Notable highlights for 2014 include:

- Several high class university facilities on display for the 2014 AUG hosted in Sydney including the University Technology Sydney (UTS) Multi Purpose Sports Hall, The University of Sydney Sports and Aquatic Centre, The University of New South Wales (UNSW) cricket and hockey fields, Macquarie University (MQU) Sport and Aquatic Centre and sports fields.
- Eleven universities and 42 team captains involved in the Be the Influence Leadership Program resulting in some successful new programs introduced including at Australian College of Physical Education.
- Sixteen students represented Australia at the Winter Olympics and Paralympics from the following member universities: Charles Sturt University (CSU), University of Notre Dame (UNDA), The University of Newcastle (NCLC), University of Western Sydney (UWS), UNSW, MQU,
- University of Canberra (UC), UTS, USYD, and MQU were all involved with the 2014 Asia Pacific Tennis League, with UTS hosting the North East Conference grand final.
- Intervarsity event between UC and The Australian National University (ANU) ran successfully in September with six sports contested.
- The UNSW Men's water polo team won the National League, their swim club won the New South Wales State Open Short Course Swimming Title for the first time, and their men's cricket team represented Australia at the Red Bull World Campus Cricket Titles in the United Kingdom in July and they made the semi finals.
- UTS going back to back in a clean sweep of the Australian University Championship - Triathlon, winning both the men's and women's championships and the AUS Federation Trophy, for overall university champion.

SOUTH

The south members remained committed to providing students with increased opportunities for participation and support for club development structures. Below are some of the highlight achievements for 2014:

- The expansion of intervarsity sport programs continued with the Varsity Challenge between Monash University (MON) and The University of Melbourne (MELB) and the South Australia Challenge continues to be a key event on the calendar for The University of Adelaide (AU), Flinders University (FU) and The University of South Australia (USA).
- AUS, in partnership with Melbourne Rebels Rugby Union, conducted the inaugural Victorian Rugby 7s Intervarsity Challenge as a lead up event to the Australian University Games. This project was funded through Sport and Recreation Victoria. Teams that participated included Australian Catholic University, Deakin University, Swinburne University of Technology (SUT), Victoria University (VU), RMIT, MON and MELB. MELB was crowned the inaugural champions.
- AUS south region was formally recognised by Sport and Recreation Victoria as the peak sector body in Victoria.
- Congratulations to USA on their first top ten finish at the Australian University Games in the university's history. USA also developed its first Team USA Strategic plan from 2015-2018.
- MELB defended their women's division title in the Australian Boat Race, defeating The University of Sydney.
- Seven of the top twenty universities at 2014 AUG were South members
- RMIT opened A'Beckett Urban Square on 10 July 2014. The former carpark was transformed into multipurpose recreation space for RMIT students in Melbourne CBD.
- MON completed the redevelopment of the Doug Ellis Pool and sport building at the Clayton campus.
- 42 participants attended the Be the Influence workshop.

WEST

Tertiary Sports Western Australia (TSWA) achieved an overall participation of 4,638 across all aspects of the program including state university championships, Australian University Games qualifiers, feature events, developmental sport competitions, university team representation in community events, the Alcohol. Think Again Fairest and Best Awards and 'PracConnect' student field placement scheme. Highlights for this include:

- Successful delivery of the TSWA program including 98% of planned competitions.
- 80 selection trials conducted by Western Australian universities attracting a participation of 1,817.
- Team participation of 198 resulting in a team occupancy of 82%.
- Equal gender opportunities to compete in TSWA offered with a ratio of 58% male/42% female achieved.
- Three feature events delivered including the Vice Chancellor's Shield Hockey Classic hosted by Curtin University, Vice Chancellor's Cup Rowing and Sailing Regatta hosted by The University of Western Australia (UWA) and Bunbury Challenge hosted by Edith Cowan University (ECU).
- Inaugural TSWA Women's Rugby 7's training workshop and exhibition match delivered with the support of Rugby Western Australia.
- Full representation from all five Western Australian universities in the TSWA AFL 9's (women) competition.
- Four community events now offering university team categories attracting over 1,000 participants
- 53 student competitors selected for the Alcohol. Think Again Fairest and Best Awards.
- Partnered with AUS to deliver the Be The Influence Leadership Program in Perth.
- National Indigenous Tertiary Education Student Games hosted by UWA attracting over 300 competitors and 23 teams.

COMMERCIAL PARTNERSHIPS

As any national sport organisation in Australia will know, sponsorship and commercial partnerships are vitally important to the financial viability and overall success of the business. AUS has worked hard over the past four years to rebuild and maintain a very strong portfolio of sponsors that complement the business and provide members and event participants with important benefits and positive experiences. 2014 wasn't without its challenges for commercial partnerships with the loss of Ice Break and the change of federal government which resulted in the conclusion of the Be the Influence Tackling Binge Drinking campaign on 30 June 2014.

Thankfully, AUS was able to retain the name of the program (minus the tackling binge drinking) and secure PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC) as a supporting partner in 2014. Thanks to PwC and the support of our members, AUS continued delivery of the Be the Influence Leadership Program in Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Perth and for the first time in Adelaide.

MARKETING

AUS again developed and distributed a complete suite of printed and electronic marketing collateral to members to assist them to promote and market the full suite of AUS events.

For the third year in a row, members were provided with design files to allow them to personalise the collateral to their specific university messages. AUS also provided members with a 12 month marketing plan that outlined key dates and activities being delivered by AUS that could act as prompts for Sports Officers and use as a guide for their own marketing activities on campus.

A primary focus for AUS marketing activities in 2014 was to increase the level of engagement between AUS and its fans, particularly via social media channels. Data gathered throughout 2013 indicated that photo and video content that featured students at AUS events were the predominate catalyst for engagement from followers.

For example, AUS facebook statistics show that close to 2,000 likes were acquired during each post event period when students would revisit the AUS facebook page, like the page, and tag themselves and their friends or share content with their friends. Consequently the AUS marketing team focused its efforts on ensuring high quality images were taken and student focused video content was captured during events.

New initiatives in 2014 included:

- Introduction of GeoSnapShot services at AUG. This online photo hosting website gave AUS the ability to leverage their extensive database of volunteer photographers to cover the Games and then host the photos and provide the photographers with the chance to earn income from selling their shots on the GeoSnapShot platform
- Live streaming of sport at the EUG and then again at the AUG via Bar TV. Based in Newcastle, Bar TV is an online broadcaster that specialised in telecasting grass roots sport via YouTube channels. At EUG Bar TV enlisted the help of 20 Film and Television student volunteers to live stream or film and

package all 17 sports. At AUG, eight sports were live streamed via the AUS YouTube channel.

There were a number of major announcements made by AUS and acknowledgements of achievements by AUS members in 2014 that were distributed to traditional media outlets and the broader Australian and International sport sector. These included:

- Announcement of Deidre Anderson as the new AUS President
- Announcement of Martin Doulton as the new FISU Oceania President
- AUS awards - recognition for outstanding sporting achievements in 2014
- Announcement of Bond University Georgina Hope Rinehart Swimming Excellence Scholarship

The AUS marketing team continued to work closely with the AUS high performance team to identify and

distribute newsworthy media stories about elite student athletes attending World University Championship events throughout 2014.

There were also plenty of newsworthy reports of former and current Unirooms competing in the Winter Olympic Games in Sochi, Russia held in February and at the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, Scotland in July.

A total of 48 media releases were distributed by AUS resulting in a total of 177 media articles that mention Australian University Sport, AUS events, and elite student athletes that competed at Summer and Winter Universiade events or Commonwealth Games and Winter Olympic Games.

SPECIAL EVENTS

GAMES LAUNCHES

Continuing the same strategy employed in 2013, AUS staged three event launches in the first half of 2014 on host regional university games campuses in Newcastle, Wodonga and the Sunshine Coast. These launches were designed to raise awareness of sporting opportunities locally on these campuses, but also to generate digital content to kick off the promotions and registrations drive across the country. Media opportunities were also conducted, with elite local sporting talent in attendance alongside government representatives.

Another launch was held for the Australian University Games (AUG) on 20 June, staged on the iconic Fleet Steps in Sydney's Royal Botanic Gardens. The site had a panoramic view of the Sydney Opera House and Harbour Bridge, providing the perfect backdrop to stage a demonstration football competition between the five host universities of UTS, UNSW, USYD, MQU and UWS. The Games were officially launched by University of Technology Sydney (UTS) Vice Chancellor and AUS Board Director Professor Ross Milbourne, in front of a crowd of 100 invited dignitaries and selected students.

OPENING CEREMONIES

Continuing on from the success and growth of the product of Opening Ceremonies, AUS continued to provide large scale dance party events for students at Regional and Australian University Games in 2014. For the 2014 Regional University Games, event ticket price was included in overall Games registration to allow for all students to have access to the Opening night event experience. The largest and most iconic venues in each of the host cities were chosen as the host venue and headline entertainment was flown in to entertain students throughout the night. The official formalities and opening of the Games, were held inside of the VIP function only in front of an audience of approximately 100 - 150 games stakeholders, university team managers and team captains.

In Sydney for the AUG, the Opening Night was held at the iconic venue of Ivy in the CBD, playing host to 4,000 students across multiple entertainment areas at the venue. The entertainment offering included the full Pacha experience, a specialised nightclub show originating from Ibiza including dancers and pyrotechnics, alongside up and coming Australian DJ talent. At the VIP function, for the first time ever the team captains from the partner

universities acted as Master of Ceremonies, every team captain from every competing university was presented with a team captain cap and the first team captain photo was taken - heralding the start of a new tradition.

CLOSING PRESENTATIONS

Following tradition AUS has continued to stage Closing Presentations at the conclusion of the three regional university games and the AUG, to acknowledge overall university winners, per capita winners, spirit of the games awards and trophy and pennant presentations for each sport. At regional university games, these were held in conjunction following gold medal matches on the final day of competition, with Sydney University Sport and Fitness hosting the AUG Closing.

SOCIAL PROGRAM

AUS engaged night club venues in each host city location as a risk management strategy to provide exclusive and safe venues for students to socialise each night of the Games.

The Red Frogs Crew were again engaged to provide participants across all AUS events with hydration stations and general on ground peer support.

AACA NATIONAL BAND COMP

At the 2014 AUG, AUS partnered with the Australian Association of Campus Activities (AACA), to stage the annual national campus band competition finals. These were held inside of the AUG social program on Wednesday 1 October at Home Nightclub in Darling Harbour.

HIGH PERFORMANCE



In 2014, a total of 73 elite student athletes represented Australia at eleven of the World University Championships (WUC).

With a focus on athletes with the potential to claim a top ten finish, the teams were streamlined to include students identified as world class.

Australia achieved 16 top eight results with the most notable performances achieved by the men's match racing team led by University of Western Australia's Sam Gilmour who won silver at the WUC Match Racing in Lago di Vedro, Italy in June and the bronze medal won by University of Queensland student,

Fiona Albert, at the WUC Rowing in Gravelines, France in September.

The results produced in 2014 are as a result of the specific focus that the high performance program places on fielding the highest possible quality athletes and teams in international university competition and have illustrated the continuing strength of Australian University Sport within the FISU community.

The 2014 Australian University Games returned to Sydney for the first time since 2001, and was only possible due to the strong support provided by Destination NSW and the five partner universities. Sydney proved to be a popular location for students, attracted by the high quality of sporting venues and the non sporting attractions of the city. Feedback from participants and stakeholders alike indicated the event was one of the best AUGs ever.

Total participation exceeded 8,100 with 7,125 student participants and 665 non playing officials, together with a large number of staff, volunteers, officials and suppliers. It was the second highest participation total in the event's history, only exceeded by the 2013 Gold Coast event.

The Games not only provided an opportunity for students to compete, but also to gain valuable work experience, with many local students opting to volunteer for the event. The volunteer program was another successful feature of the event with over 280 volunteers (students and non students) assisting at this year's event. Without them, the event would simply not run.

The University of Sydney won the title of overall champion university, winning an unprecedented 18 pennants, with Bond University winning the Doug Ellis per capita award and Edith Cowan University the John White Spirit of the Games.

The 2014 Northern University Games were the largest yet with the event attracting over 1700 competitors, officials and staff to the Sunshine Coast from eleven universities. AUS is grateful for partnerships with the Sunshine Coast Council and the University of the Sunshine Coast.

For the second year in a row, Queensland University of Technology were crowned the Jodie Martin Overall Champions. The University of New England were the winners of the North Region Per Capita Trophy and Griffith University the recipients of the Ron Leahy Spirit of the Games.

The Tertiary Sports Western Australia (TSWA) calendar of events provided opportunities for students and teams representing the five Western Australian Universities to participate in 48 sporting competitions from March to September across 15 events featuring 24 sports.

Of the competitions on offer 98% were successfully delivered attracting 198 teams generating a participation of 1,740. Curtin University fielded the greatest number of teams in TSWA competitions generating the largest overall participation of any one competing university closely followed by The University of Western Australia (UWA).

As TSWA events are now hotly contested, member universities conducted selection trials contributing to a further participation of over 1,817. The success of negotiations between TSWA and organisers of four community events resulted in the inclusion of 'university team' categories attracting over 1,000 participants. The Alcohol. Think Again Fairest and Best Awards, created to raise the awareness of the health message and issues related to alcohol consumption, recognised 53 student competitors in TSWA competitions for outstanding performances.

Congratulations to UWA, Overall Champion University for the 15th year running accumulating 135 championship points. Curtin University teams and players are to be congratulated for consistently displaying positive sporting attributes throughout the program to secure the Western Spirit Award.

On the national scene, West Australian universities had the opportunity to participate in the National Tertiary Education Student Games (NITESG) on home ground in Perth. UWA School of Indigenous Studies and UWA Sports partnered to deliver the event which attracted a record number of teams. The UWA Western Waagyls teams placing 1st and 3rd respectively, Murdoch 5th, Curtin 7th, ECU/Curt (combined with ACU) 13th and Notre Dame 15th.

DISTANCE RUNNING

2014 was the second year of the expanded event series format which saw the championship include four major running events including the Gold Coast Airport Marathon, Real Insurance Sydney Harbour 10km, Balckmore's Sydney Harbour Running Festival and the Medibank Melbourne Marathon. The overall championship was won by The University of Melbourne who also took home the men's pennant whilst Monash University won the women's pennant with both universities going back to back in the respective category.

ORIENTEERING

This year's event was held as part of the Australian Orienteering Championship in Clandulla, New South Wales. A total of 18 male and 10 female students competed from 12 universities.

ROWING

This year's event was held in conjunction with the Australian University Games. Hosted by the Sydney International Regatta Centre. More than 300 students took to the water, with a further 30 nonplaying officials in attendance. This year's event provided perfect weather as The University of Sydney completed a clean sweep of the men's and women's pennants and in doing so the overall champion title. The growth of this year's event saw crews from a total of 19 universities compete in the championship event.

SURFING

This year's event was held in conjunction with the Eastern University Games in Newcastle and attracted 91 surfers including several ASP world tour riders from a total of 13 universities. Southern Cross University won the overall championship in a clean sweep of the men's and women's pennants on the back of several high profile students.

SNOW SPORTS

The Australian University Championship Snow Sports broke new ground this year with record numbers of 420 competitors and a total 450 participants taking to the slopes of Mt Buller. With 20 universities represented from across the country, The University of Melbourne was able to record the trifecta by winning the overall champion

for the last three years. The University of Newcastle received the Spirit of the Mountain pennant for their team's camaraderie and overall sportsmanship displayed at the event. The University of Melbourne took home the pennant for overall women's champion and the overall men's champion went to The University of New South Wales.

TRIATHLON

In the second year of the expanded event series format the University of Technology Sydney was able to reclaim the title of overall champion and both the men's and women's pennant. This year's event series included legs in the Australian Capital Territory, South Australia, Queensland, Victoria and New South Wales.

TWENTY20™ CRICKET

This year's event was held in conjunction with the 2014 Australian University Games in Sydney. With 15 teams returning to competition the University of Technology Sydney was able to win the pennant just beating reigning champions The University of New South Wales.

FISU OCEANIA

Strengthening its links with the International University Sports Federation (FISU), in 2014 Oceania University Sports Association (OUSA) became formally known as FISU Oceania. Despite the ever present challenges presented via the vastness of Oceania, FISU Oceania continues to make inroads into the promotion of university sport in the Oceania region.

Once again, AUS has taken a proactive and supportive role in the development of FISU Oceania often using its scale to coordinate and assist other member countries to access FISU events and to grow and develop university sport in their countries. Members of FISU Oceania are American Samoa, Australia, Cook Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Fiji, Guam, New Caledonia, New Zealand, Northern Mariana Islands, Papua New Guinea and Samoa.

GOVERNANCE

Since 2011 AUS has offered a bureau service to FISU Oceania for all its administrative and financial activities. With AUS Board member Martin Doulton as the newly elected President and the FISU Oceania representative member on the FISU Executive Committee and the FISU Oceania Finance Management Committee under the guidance of its Chair Don Knapp, together with the support of AUS Finance and Administration Manager Glenys Woolcock and secretarial support by Toni Lourens, FISU Oceania administrative and finances continue to meet all FISU audit requirements.

TEAM MANAGEMENT SEMINAR SERIES

Thanks to FISU project support it was possible to hold additional myunisport Team Management workshops and seminars during 2014. Program leader Donna Spethman (Australia) conducted seminars in Northern Mariana Islands in June and also in September as part of the FISU Oceania General Assembly.

FISU OCEANIA AT THE 2014 WORLD UNIVERSITY CHAMPIONSHIPS

In 2014, 90 athletes from FISU Oceania competed at 11 World University Championships. While the majority of these competitors represented Australia and New Zealand, there were 16 top ten finishers and a number of notable performances including a silver medal by the Australian men's crew at the WUC Match Racing and a bronze medal by Fiona Albert (Australia) at the WUC Rowing.

FISU OCEANIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

On Monday 29th September 2014, FISU Oceania held its Annual General Meeting in Sydney, Australia. The General Assembly not only acknowledged the activities of the past 12 months but also provided the opportunity to look ahead. In doing so, a newly elected committee was formed with Martin Doulton from Australia becoming the new President. Joined by FISU Director of Development and Special Projects, Laurent Briel and European University Sports Association Secretary General, Matjaz Pecovnik, the event was a huge success and has laid a solid foundation for FISU Oceania in the years to come.

FISU FORUM

Twenty representatives from FISU Oceania travelled to Gwangju in Korea for the 12th FISU Forum. In conjunction with the FISU Forum, Oceania held two days of Executive Committee meetings resulting in some robust discussion and actions to move the region ahead.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

The FISU Oceania General Assembly in Sydney also enabled student representatives from the Oceania region to attend and observe the General Assembly and then take part in a strategic planning session that will lead FISU Oceania into the next 12 months and beyond. Students were engaged in a series of workshops where topics on Personal Branding, Emotional Intelligence and Event Management were presented.
