2022 CHAIR/CEO REPORT

After two years
of uncertainty due
to the worldwide
effects of COVID-19,
2022 saw a return to
more normal activity.





Members all reported an increase in on campus activity as universities encouraged students to return to face-to-face learning and engagement activities on campus increased. With greater certainty UniSport Australia was able to plan and deliver a full program of events, for many students this was the first time they had the opportunity to fully experience intervarsity rivalry and competition.

Several highlights from 2022 epitomized the growth of UniSport Australia. The UBL expanded to eleven members, with winning teams La Trobe University and The University of Sydney being invited to tour Chinese Taipei for a three games series. In addition, a successful Sport Australia funding grant to support universities grow on campus participation through UniSport My Way program commenced and the successful Nationals in Perth, with almost six thousand student athletes competing across thirty-five sports, was a welcome return of activity.

Many of the opportunities developed through Covid were continued with members attending a range of online and in person workshops covering topics from team management, leadership in uncertain environments, conversation cafes to sharing best practice. Furthermore, the annual National Conference and AGM returned, hosted by The University of Sydney, with a healthy combination of members and students sharing their experiences as well as considering the future opportunities for student and sport was appreciated by all who attended.

The organisation made significant progress with the implementation of the strategic plan, whilst simultaneously returning to financial surplus. The value of university sport was further promoted to both the tertiary sector and the wider sports industry as typified by the growing investment in leagues and the investment by Sport Australia to grow participation. The competition opportunities continue to grow with UniSport assuming the operations of the Women's rugby sevens and expanded participation programs. Despite the successes we are still mindful of strengthening our processes with the integration of student perspective and inclusion and diversity strategies.



Congratulations to all of the teams that won national championships, but special mention must go Macquarie University 3X3 men's team that won the UniSport Nationals and went on to win a silver medal at the World University 3X3 Championships in Turkey. We would also like to acknowledge our continuing partnership with the Wollotuka Institute that saw the Indigenous Nationals expertly hosted by the Queensland University of Technology.

Finally, we would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the vast number of people that make university sport possible; from the team mangers,

to all the part time and full time staff that make sport on campus possible. To all the CEOs that willingly give of their time and expertise to ensure sport is valued by the sector a huge thank you. Lastly, to the board and staff of UniSport Australia who gave so much of themselves over the past two years to ensure UniSport was ready to relaunch itself post the pandemic, our sincere thanks.

MEMBER SERVICES

UniSport continues to strive to provide services that will assist members in reaching their key strategic objectives. These services include advocacy support, engagement and networking opportunities, education and training as well as intervarsity events Including UniSport Nationals.

In 2022 UniSport offered 43 different services to assist members with their goals and activities. Of the services offered, 28 were achieved, nine were partially achieved, three were not achieved with three either postponed or unable to be offered due to specific circumstances.

The UniSport member satisfaction survey returned an average satisfaction score of 3.6/5. This was down on satisfaction levels of 3.8/5 from 2021. Since the inception of the UniSport member satisfaction survey in 2019, the average member satisfaction rating is 3.75/5.



Information following, outlines key areas of activity within Member Services (excluding events):

Develop and evolve the structure and servicing of UniSport members

- Two CEO Forums and seven clubs officer conversation cafés were held providing information, updates, sharing of member news and best practice.
- At least three member forums were held in each region throughout 2022. These forums focused on member updates, sharing of information and UniSport event updates.
- UniSport National Conference was held in conjunction with the Annual General Meeting in Sydney from 10-12 May. The event attracted over 80 delegates from 28 universities.
- Develop the capacity of industry staff
- UniSport staff developed four specific online courses to train and educate member personnel in preparation for attending UniSport Nationals in Perth. These courses were promoted as a Team Management 101 series and included:
 - » An essential guide to UniSport events for university team managers
 - » A guide for university team managers re UniSport Nationals event administration
 - » A guide outlining a typical day in the life of a university team manager at a UniSport event
 - » An incident management course to prepare a university team manager in dealing with an event whilst on tour with a team

- The member resource area of the UniSport
 website was updated with over 40 resources
 including best practice and toolkits, to assist
 members in showcasing best practice, provision
 of templates as well as information guides such
 as the UniSport three part incident
 management guide.
- Specific toolkits were developed and made available to members via the members area of the UniSport website. These toolkits included a clubs toolkit with a focus on managing clubs and a You Can Play toolkit with a focus on inclusion and ensuring clubs on campus are welcoming to all. The You Can Play toolkit was developed with support from Sport and Recreation Victoria.



Develop student capacity

- Students had the opportunity to attend the UniSport AGM and National Conference where a specific student stream was scheduled. In total 15 students from ten universities were represented at this event.
- The UniSport BTI (Be The Influence) Team Leader course was delivered online to more than 136 students from 39 universities. Whilst in person courses were offered, online courses were deemed more suitable enabling students to easily fit the course into their schedule.
- A Team Captain 101 online course was developed by UniSport staff providing an introduction to students who were attending UniSport Nationals

- Perth for the first time, as a captain of their sporting team. This course focussed on the role of the team captain prior to, during and post event, as providing tips on leading a touring team. The course was completed by 98 students from 17 universities.
- The UniSport Student Advisory Group continued to provide feedback and input to UniSport programs and events. The group met three times throughout the year in an online format and the group also contributed to two online surveys.

Opportunities for members

- Numerous members provided their skills and expertise to UniSport working groups in the areas of national conference, technology solutions, member fee review and constitutional change.
- Wade Spencer from Victoria University fulfilled an event assistant role at the UniSport Nationals Snow event.

In addition to the above success areas:

- UniSport promoted 36 member stories showcasing the university sector to the wider Australia sport community.
- Deakin University, James Cook University,
 The University of Western Australia and
 University of South Australia showcased
 best practices in the areas of sustainability,
 participation, Inclusion and academic
 partnerships at the National Conference.
- Eight conversation cafés were held for Club
 Officers where information, resources and best
 practice where shared amongst this network of
 staff members from more than 30 universities.



UniSport MyWay Program

The UniSport MyWay program was launched in April 2022 with the goal to increase participation in grassroots physical activity and sport on university campuses across the country. The MyWay program assisted 30 universities to deliver bespoke activity programs at 69 campuses reaching 40,000 participants across Australia.

UniSport MyWay included a range of activities from ultimate frisbee and wheelchair basketball, to a campus amazing race, picnic games and a multi-campus move-a-thon. UniSport MyWay was accessible to all but specifically aimed to engage a number of audiences including students not already active; women and girls; people with a disability; culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people; Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples; and the general population.

A Student Ambassador program was integral to the delivery of the UniSport MyWay program, aiming to help increase the capacity of member universities to deliver sport and activity programs on campus. 53 Student Ambassadors from 24 universities were engaged, with the program designed to provide personal and professional development through the training provided and experience in delivering activity programs and managing ongoing participation opportunities.

This project received funding from the Australian Government through Sport Australia and UniSport would like to acknowledge and thank them for their support.



Sport sector surveys

Unisport continued the collection of data relevant for sector and member benchmarking. In 2022, data collection focussed on clubs and elite athlete programs. Data collected will be combined with previous years data to produce comparable results for members spanning 2019-2022.

Whilst understanding ongoing challenges such as staffing and funding, sport continues to be a driver to a quality student experience and UniSport members continue to be successful in ensuring sport can bring positive experiences and social connection.

Chengdu 2021 Summer University Games

The 32nd edition of the Summer World University Games were scheduled to be held in 2023 in Yekaterinburg, Russia. Due to the global environment, FISU imposed a number of sanctions on Russia including suspending Ekaterinburg's hosting of the FISU World University Games. The 2021 FISU Summer World University Games already postponed to 2022 was again postponed as a result of the ongoing impacts of the Covid pandemic. The games will now be held in Chengdu from 28 July to 8 August 2023.

28 athletes and five officials participated in five World University Championships (Beach Volleyball, Cross Country, Orienteering, Sport Climbing and Triathlon).



Student representation at the 2022 Commonwealth Games

The 2022 Commonwealth Games took place in Birmingham, England between 28 July and 8 August 2022. From the data collected with the support of UniSport members, almost half of the Australian team had ties to university sport. More than 190 student-athletes, alumni and university club members from 27 Australian universities represented Australia, bringing home medals in 16 different sports.

2022 Beijing Winter Olympics

The 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics saw 26 athletes selected to the 2022 Australian team with ties to university sport. Of note was the performance of Jakara Anthony (Deakin University, Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science) winning gold in the Freestyle Skiing Women's Moguls.

OVERVIEW

2022 saw the UniSport Nationals return with a full calendar of events after two very challenging years for the sector. The Nationals in its entirety sees a yearlong calendar of events hosted across Australia, allowing any university team the opportunity to become crowned Nationals Champions in their respective sports, and one university to be crowned the Overall Champion University.

In 2022, nine Nationals Championship events took place with our major multi-sport event, the UniSport Nationals, returning to Perth for the first time since 2016. In total more than 8,500 student-athletes, coaches, support staff and volunteers were involved across the program, showcasing that despite the unplanned hiatus in competition, the appetite to be back on the field and competing against fellow students remains high.

Nationals Championships

Triathlon

In 2022, Nationals Triathlon returned to the Sunshine Coast, Queensland as part of the 30th anniversary of Mooloolaba Triathlon. The championships were contested in sprint and standard distances, with 196 student-athletes taking part in the gruelling weekend of racing. Kirsty Beattie (The Australian National University) and Jack Crome (Queensland University of Technology) took first place in the sprint distance whilst Romy Wolstencroft (Queensland University of Technology) and Michael Boult (University of Tasmania) achieved success in the standard event. Although Queensland University of Technology won celebrated individual podium success, it was the consistency and representation of The University of Queensland team that saw them claim the overall champion titles.

Athletics

Nationals Athletics was held on the Gold Coast, Queensland from 19-21 April, attracting 365 student-athletes from 38 universities. Eight UniSport track and field records were broken throughout the championships, including the decathlon and heptathlon events which were held earlier in the year at the Australian Track and Field Championships. The University of Sydney were crowned overall champions after taking out both the men's and women's pennants, reasserting their dominance as the premier university for athletics.

3x3 Basketball

In 2022, Nationals 3x3 Basketball headed to Hobart, Tasmania and were hosted by University of Tasmania at their partner venue, Swisherr Hoops Academy. From 20-22 April, 15 women's teams and 16 men's teams challenged the fourth 3x3 Big Hustle Uni Nationals; a co-branded event resulting from UniSport's ongoing relationship with 3x3Hustle; Australia's official 3x3 pathway. Macquarie University (men) and University of Technology Sydney (women) dominated their respective competitions to claim gold medals.

League of Legends

UniSport teamed up with META Esports to deliver the 2022 UniSport Nationals League of Legends championships. The competition was held online throughout July and attracted 25 teams from 16 universities. Deakin University won gold against defending champions University of Technology Sydney to claim the Div 1 overall champion title. Monash University claimed gold in Division 2 against University of NSW Sydney.



Indigenous Nationals presented by BP

The 26th annual Indigenous Nationals returned to Queensland in 2022, for the first time since 2016. The week-long multisport event was hosted by Queensland University of Technology on the Traditional Lands of the Turrbal and Yugara People (Brisbane). Twenty-nine teams participated across four sports; basketball, netball, touch football and volleyball as well as celebrated their Indigenous culture and history through ceremonies and social activities.

Australian Catholic University were crowned champions for the second year running, following consistent performances in all four sports.

Surfing

In 2022, Nationals Surfing took place at Coolum Beach on the Sunshine Coast, Queensland. The event attracted 44 participants and was contested in shortboard, longboard, bodyboard, and a teams challenge event. Peter Kavanagh (Bachelor of Primary Education) from The University of Notre Dame Australia dominated in the individual performance results however The University of Queensland men's team claimed the overall men's champion university. Anna Toohey (Bachelor of Primary Special Education) from Australian Catholic University dominated the women's competition after finishing on the podium in all disciplines. Strong performances from Southern Cross University in the women's events earned them the overall women's and combined champion university awards.

T20 Cricket

Maroochydore and Caloundra Cricket Clubs on the Sunshine Coast, Queensland, played host to the 2022 Nationals T20 Cricket tournament. The tournament was held from 1-5 August and attracted 11 men's teams to the competition. University of Tasmania beat The University of Queensland to claim the bronze medal. University of Technology Sydney upset the defending champions The University of Sydney to be crowned overall champions.

Distance Running

In 2022, Nationals Distance Running was hosted by the Blackmores Sydney Running Festival. The event saw over 600 competitors from across Australia race in Half-Marathon and Marathon distances across the weekend. University of Technology Sydney and The University of Sydney won the men's and women's Distance Running Champions title respectively.

Snow

Nationals Snow returned to the slopes of Mt Buller in 2022; four years after the championships were last held at the Victorian ski resort. 154 student-athletes competed in the sports of alpine skiing, freestyle skiing and snowboarding events. Unfortunately, unfavourable weather conditions resulted in the cancellation of the cross-country skiing events.

It was the widespread talent within the University of Technology Sydney's team that earnt them the overall champion university title. The highly regarded Spirit of the Mountain award was presented to The Australian National University following their display of sportsmanship and camaraderie towards other universities.

2022 UniSport Nationals - Perth

This year noted the second evolution of the Nationals competition framework with the removal of the Div 2 event seen in 2018 and 2019. Following strategic repositioning, the separate Div 1 and Div 2 events were amalgamated, returning to one annual major multi-sport event retaining the renewed focus of competitive intervarsity sport and enhanced participant experience.

Following the cancellation of the UniSport Nationals (in this format) in 2020 and 2021, the event returned to Perth for the first time in six years as part of a support agreement with the Western Australian Government through Tourism Western Australia.

With the change to a single event model a divisional structure was applied to the event to enable universities to rebuild their teams following almost two years of limited activity on campus. All competitions were initially delivered as one division apart from where team numbers facilitated a two divisional split (teams from 13th place onwards contested Div 2 pennants after the initial rounds).

Participant satisfaction for the Nationals achieved the highest rates seen since the delivery of the program began in 2018, with 87% of respondents being satisfied or extremely satisfied with their overall event experience. When asked to provide their thoughts on the event, participants responded: During the seven-day event hosted across 26 venues in the greater Perth region,

UNIVERSITY BASKETBALL LEAGUE AUSTRALIA 2022



In 2022 the University Basketball League Australia (UBL) returned for its second year. After COVID-19 impacts in 2021 resulted in abandonment of the final round match as well as cancellation of the finals, it was exciting to see the 2022 UBL increase in participation to 11 universities for both men and women with 116 games being held across a 10 week period from 21 March to 25 May 2022.

Following the completion of the regular season, the top four universities from both the men's and the women's competitions came together in Melbourne for the semi-finals with games on Tuesday 17 May at La Trobe University and Wednesday 18 May at Victoria University. The conclusion of the semi-finals saw undefeated teams La Trobe University (women) and The University of Sydney (men) earn hosting rights of the respective grand finals matching up against The University of Sydney (women) and University of Technology Sydney (men).

The inaugural final series was held across two states with the women's grand final at La Trobe University on Tuesday 24 May and men's grand final on Wednesday 25 May at The University of Sydney. Both grand final matches were highly competitive narrowly avoiding overtime. Congratulations to La Trobe University women and The University of Sydney men as the respective winners of the UBL.

The quality of basketball played throughout the season as well as the finals showcased a number of outstanding moments including some firsts for the UBL – two matches in the women's league saw the first overtime women's games with Curtin University v University of Technology Sydney and La Trobe University v University of Technology Sydney both finding themselves playing additional minutes.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements cover Uniport Australia Limited ("UniSport") an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. UniSport is a company limited by guarantee. The financial statements were authorised for issue by the directors of the company as at the date of the directors' declaration.

Basis of Preparation

The directors have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the company is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not-f or-profit company for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Corporations Act 2001 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below. which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

a) Revenue

Operating grants, Sponsorships and Host funding fees

When the company receives operating grants, sponsorships and host funding fees it assesses whether the contract or agreement with the respective customer is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both of these conditions are satisfied, the company:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the agreement with the customer
- recognises unearned income for its obligations under the agreement
- recognises revenue as it satisfies each performance obligation.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the company:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable *accounting standards i.e. AASB 9, and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the company recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the agreement.

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Merchandise sales, Awards and conference fees, Ticket and lift passes

Revenue from the sale of merchandise, awards and conference fees, tickets and lift passes is recognised at the point of delivery as this corresponds to the transfer of significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods or service and the cessation of all involvement in those goods or services.

Membership fees

Membership fees are levied annually and recorded as revenue over time to coincide with the membership period. Only those membership fees attributable to the current financial year are recognised as revenue, membership fees relating to periods beyond the current financial year are shown in the Statement of Financial Position as Income received in advance within current liabilities.

All other revenue is recognised once the company has earned the right to the revenue by satisfying its performance obligations which is usually at a point in time.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

c) Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and any impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (ref to j below for further details of impairment).

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Class of Fixed Assets

Depreciation Rate

Furniture, Fittings and Equipment Computer Equipment

5-50% straight line 13-33% straight line

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

d) Intangibles Software

Software is recorded at cost. Where software is acquired at no cost, or for a nominal cost, the cost is its fair value as at the date of acquisition. It has a finite life and is carried at cost less accumulated amortization and any impairment losses. Software has an estimated useful life of between one and four years. It is assessed annually for impairment.

e) Leases

The Company as a lessee

At inception of a contract, the company assesses if a lease exists. If there is a lease present, a right-of-use asset and a corresponding lease liability is recognised by the company where the company is a lessee. However, all contracts that are classified as short-term leases (lease with a lease term of 12 months or less) and leases of low-value assets are recognised as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

f) Employee Provisions Short-term Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries and sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

The company's obligations for short-term employee benefits such as wages, salaries and sick leave are recognised as part of accounts payable and other payables in the statement of financial position.

Contributions are made by the company to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred

Other long-term employee benefits

Provision is made for employees' long service leave and annual leave entitlements not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Upon the remeasurement of obligations for other long-term employee benefits, the net change in the obligation is recognised in profit or loss as part of employee benefits expense.

The company's obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current provisions in its statement of financial position, except where the company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are presented as current provisions.

Financial Instruments

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted). Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Classification and Subsequent Measurement

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest expense in profit or loss over the relevant period.

The effective interest rate is the internal rate of return of the financial asset or liability. That is, it is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash flows through the expected life of the instrument to the net carrying amount at initial recognition.

A financial liability cannot be reclassified.

Financial Assets

Financial assets are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost; or
- fair value through other comprehensive income.



NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

g) Financial Instruments (continued)

Measurement is on the basis of the two primary criteria, being:

- the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset; and
- the business model for managing the financial assets.

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is managed solely to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates.

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income:

- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates; and
- the business model for managing the financial asset comprises both contractual cash flows collection and the selling of the financial asset.

By default, all other financial assets that do not meet the conditions of amortised cost and the fair value through other comprehensive income's measurement condition are subsequently measured at fair value through profit and loss.

The company does not measure any financial assets as fair value through profit or loss.

Derecognition

Derecognition refers to the removal of a previously recognised financial asset or financial liability from the statement of financial position.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A liability is derecognised when it is extinguished (ie when the obligation in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires). An exchange of an existing financial liability for a new one with substantially modified terms, or a substantial modification to the terms of a financial liability, is treated as an extinguishment of the existing liability and recognition of a new financial liability.

The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are substantially transferred.

All of the following criteria need to be satisfied for derecognition of a financial asset:

- the right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired or been transferred;
- all risk and rewards of ownership of the asset have been substantially transferred; and
- the company no longer controls the asset (ie it has no practical ability to make unilateral decisions to sell the asset to a third party).

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a debt instrument classified as f air value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the financial asset reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

g) Financial Instruments (continued)

Impairment

The company recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on:

- financial assets that are measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income.

Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

The company used the following approaches to impairment, as applicable under AASB 9 Financial Instruments:

- the general approach;

General approach

Under the general approach, at each reporting period, the company assessed whether the financial instruments are credit impaired, and if:

- there was no significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the company measured the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses.

Recognition of expected credit losses in financial statements

At each reporting date, the company recognises the movement in the loss allowance as an impairment gain or loss in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The carrying amount of financial assets measured at amortised cost includes the loss allowance relating to that asset.

Assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are recognised at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in other comprehensive income. The amount in relation to change in credit risk is transferred from other comprehensive income to profit or loss at every reporting period.

h) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the company reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value- in-use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where the future economic benefits of the assets are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inf lows and when the company would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of any applicable GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

Income Tax j)

No provision for income tax has been raised as the company is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from donors and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

I) **Deferred Expenses**

When expenditure is incurred for a project or event scheduled to take place in another accounting period it is deferred and recognised as an asset on the balance sheet until such time as the project or event subsequently takes place. The deferred expenditure is then recognised in profit or loss once the project or event has occurred.

m) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

n) **Comparative Figures**

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the company.

Key estimates

i. Impairment

The company assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluating of conditions and events specific to the company that may be indicative of impairment triggers.

No impairment has been recognised for the year ended 31 December 2022.

Key Judgements

i. Performance obligations under AASB 15

To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied. Management exercises judgement to determine whether the promise is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the arrangement, explicit or implicit, regarding the promised goods or services. In making this assessment, management includes the nature/type, cost/value, quantity and the period of transfer related to the goods or services promised.

ii. Employee benefits

For the purpose of measurement, AASB 119 - Employee Benefits defines obligations for short-term employee benefits as obligations expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. The company expects most employees will take their annual leave

entitlements within 24 months of the reporting period in which they were earned, but this will not have a material impact on the amounts recognised in respect of obligations for employees' leave entitlements.

iii. Provision for credit losses of accounts and other receivables

The directors review the recoverability of the company's accounts and other receivables on a regular basis and raise the necessary credit losses if required. The directors are satisfied that accounts and other receivables will be realised at their carrying value as at 31 December 2022 within the normal course of business

p) Economic Dependence

The company is dependent on the Federal and State Government Departments for the majority of its revenue used to operate the business. At the date of this report, the Board of Directors have no reason to believe the agencies will not continue to support the company.

q) New and Amended Accounting Policies Adopted by the Company

During the year there were a number of new or amending standards with mandatory effect. The directors have assessed that these new or amended standards were not applicable to the company.

r) New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The directors have considered new accounting standards for application in future periods and are satisfied that of those standards that are applicable to the company there will be an immaterial impact on the annual financial statements of the company.
