

Overly expanding the definition


- Dilution of the quality of athletes on your program.

- More AIS categorised athletes studying at Deakin
 University than any other Australian university
- 14 current students at the 2024 Paris Olympic and Paralympic Games representing Australia.
- This despite:
 - No formal partnerships with any Olympic sports
 - No university sport clubs participating above a local community level
 - No training centres or similar on campus
- 46 current members (16%) of the Elite Athlete Program have transferred to Deakin from other universities.

- Integrating into the university's way of working. Doing so ensures buy in from other areas of the university.

- Network with all of your internal stakeholders. Make the processes to support the athletes as easy as possible for them. Sell them the why in relation to your Elite Athlete Program.
- Focus on what you do well do you have academics in certain courses who are willing to be more flexible?
- Be available elite athlete coordination as the primary responsibility of the role.
- Your current student-athletes are your biggest advocates –
 provide them with the support and flexibility they need,
 and they will advertise your program widely.
- Don't burden your athletes by placing appearance requirements on them.
